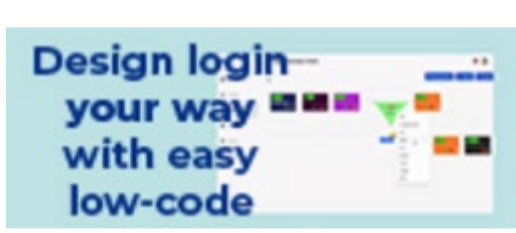

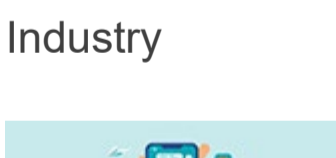


Event recommendation: Cultural Heritage in the Digital Age

Did you know?

The first typewriter keyboards were arranged alphabetically. However, due to the special design of the metal levers, they constantly got jammed the faster or more simultaneously the keys were struck. Therefore the American printer and inventor Christopher Sholes invented the "QWERTY" keyboard in the mid-19th century, which is still used today. The most frequently used letters were arranged in a semicircle to enable smooth and thus faster typing. Letters that are often used together, such as S and T, were placed far apart so that their levers no longer got jammed.

Nowadays, this problem would no longer exist - however, the "QWERTY" keyboard is still used today to avoid a tedious transition.
