GSB11: a milestone on the road to greater digital sovereignty

With the major GSB11 project, the German administration is sending a clear signal in favour of greater independence: in future, over 500 websites of federal authorities will be operated on an open source platform and (further) developed by a strong partner network. We welcome this major step towards greater digital sovereignty.

Digital sovereignty needs Free Software: Call to the EU for clear measures!

Europe's digital sovereignty is at stake. Free software is the key to greater independence. In its latest report, the European Parliament's Industry Committee (ITRE) recognises the importance of 'open source first' strategies, but remains vague when it comes to implementation. The Free Software Foundation Europe (FSFE) is therefore calling for public money to be channelled into public software. This is the only way to reduce dependencies, promote innovation and secure control over critical digital infrastructures.

Did you know?

The world-famous <u>Java programming language</u> does not take its name from a profound tradition or a particularly meaningful story. The source of inspiration behind its name is much more commonplace: coffee!

Originally, Java was to be called 'OAK', named after an oak tree that stood outside the office window of developer <u>James Gosling</u>. The name was intended to reflect the stability and strength of the language, but it had already been taken and trademarked elsewhere.

The choice finally fell on 'Java', a reference to the strong coffee of the Indonesian island of the same name, which is famous for its coffee and which the developers enjoyed consuming.

Today, Java is one of the most widely used programming languages in the world.
